BRISBANE'S NEW RUNWAY IS CLEARED FOR TAKEOFF

BRISBANE'S new \$1.1 billion parallel runway opens Sunday, with the first flights using what is set to become the east coast of Australia's most efficient air hub and creating tens of thousands of jobs.

BAC chief executive Gert-Jan de Graaff said COVID had shrunk plans for the official opening but the airport would still be celebrating with the Queensland Symphony Orchestra to perform on the runway before the first departure, a Virgin flight to Cairns.

"COVID may have hampered some of our plans to mark this historic moment but, it certainly has not detracted from our pride and sense of accomplishment," Mr de Graaff said.

The new parallel runway means huge capacity increases, with projections passenger numbers will double from 24 million to 50 million in the next 20 years and the number of direct employees soaring from 24,000 to almost 50,000. The global COVID pandemic has crippled flights numbers, slashing more than 90 per cent from international flights, but domestic flights are slowly creeping back.
